City Council Special Meeting September 5, 2023

A City Council special meeting was held on the above date at Cameron City Hall, McLane Municipal Center, 100 South Houston Avenue, 3rd Floor, Cameron, Texas with all officers and members present.

Mayor Harris called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

Council Member Deal offered the invocation.

Council Member Dominguez led the pledge of allegiance.

Mayor Harris asked for citizen's comments.

Clementine Ray stated West 12th Street, West 10th Street and West 8th Street are in disrepair and would like a response.

Mayor Harris asked Street Supervisor Craig Arnold to meet with Ms. Ray regarding her concerns.

There were no other citizens comments.

Council Member Deal moved to approve the minutes of the August 21, 2023 regular meeting. Council Member Pratt seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Mayor Harris opened a public hearing at 5:36 p.m. for the purpose of receiving public comments on a short form subdivision application for 608 West 4th Street, Cameron, Texas.

Code Enforcement Officer Ricky McCall stated that all requirements for the short form subdivision has been met.

Mayor Harris closed the public hearing at 5:37 p.m.

Council Member Deal moved to approve the short form subdivision application for 608 West 4th Street, Cameron, Texas. Council Member Cryer seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Mayor Harris opened a public hearing at 5:38 p.m. for the purpose of receiving public comments on a special use permit for a variance to place a HUD code manufactured home at 300 North Adams Avenue, Cameron, Texas.

Code Enforcement Officer Ricky McCall stated that the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended denying permit with three objections received.

Mayor Harris closed the public hearing at 5:40 p.m.

Council Member Fuchs moved to deny the special use permit at 300 North Adams Avenue, Cameron, Texas. Council Member Goza seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Mayor Harris opened a public hearing at 5:41 p.m. for the purpose of receiving public comments on a special use permit for a variance to place a HUD code manufactured home at 1601 West Main Street, Cameron, Texas.

Code Enforcement Officer Ricky McCall stated that the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended denying the permit due to unpaid property taxes.

The property owner clarified that the taxes were current as of the meeting today and showed house plans for the property.

Mayor Harris closed the public hearing at 5:43 p.m.

Council Member Deal moved to approve the special use permit at 1601 West Main Street. Council Member Dominguez seconded the motion and it carried with Council Member Fuchs opposing.

Melanie Reed and Spring Janke, representing the Cameron Chamber of Commerce, presented a request to use the downtown square for the following:

WHEREAS, the electorate of the City of Cameron, Texas, adopted a Charter at an election called for the purpose, which became effective the first Tuesday in April, 1956; and

WHEREAS, Section 127 of this Charter dictates that a newspaper published in the City of Cameron in the English language be declared as the official newspaper of the City each fiscal year;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF CAMERON, TEXAS:

That the official newspaper of the City of Cameron, Texas for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024 is hereby declared to be

Mayor Harris read the first reading of the following Ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CAMERON, TEXAS LEVYING AD VALOREM TAXES FOR USE AND SUPPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2023 AND TERMINATING SEPTEMBER 30, 2024 PROVIDING FOR APPORTIONING EACH LEVY FOR SPECIFIC PURPOSES; AND PROVIDING WHEN TAXES SHALL BECOME DUE AND WHEN SAME SHALL BECOME DELINQUENT IF NOT PAID.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Cameron, Texas, approved the municipal budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2023 and ending September 30, 2024; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that an ordinance be passed levying an ad valorem tax on all property, both real and personal, within the corporate limits of the City of Cameron, Texas in accordance with such budget and the Texas Tax Code;

WHEREAS, the City of Cameron was required to hold a public hearing on the proposed tax rate and did such on September 18, 2023.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CAMERON, TEXAS:

Section 1. There is hereby levied and there shall be collected for the maintenance and operation of the municipal government of the City of Cameron (herein the "City") and to provide an amount described by Texas Tax Code Section 26.04(e)(3)(C) for the 2023/2024 fiscal year, upon all property, real, personal and mixed, within the corporate limits of said City on January 31, 2024 subject to taxation, a tax of \$0.73 on each \$100.00 valuation of property, said tax being so levied and apportioned to the specific purposes here set forth:

- 1. For the maintenance and operation of the general government (General Fund), \$0.5583on each \$100.00 valuation of property; and
- 2. For the interest and sinking fund, \$0.1717 on each \$100.00 valuation of property

Section 2. That taxes levied under this ordinance shall be due October 1, 2023 and if not paid on or before January 31, 2024, and if then not paid, shall be delinquent and subject to penalties and interest in the manner provided by law.

Section 3. All taxes shall become a lien upon the property against which assessed, and the Milam County Tax Office as the assessor and collector of the City is hereby authorized and empowered to enforce the collection of such taxes according to the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and ordinances of the City, and shall, by virtue of the tax rolls, fix and establish a lien by levying upon such property, whether real or personal, for the payment of said taxes, penalty and interest, and the interest and penalty collected from such delinquent taxes shall be apportioned to the general fund of the City. All delinquent taxes shall bear interest from date of delinquency at the rate as prescribed by state law.

Section 4. As required by Texas Tax Code section 26.05, the following statements are provided:

THIS TAX RATE WILL RAISE MORE TAXES FOR MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS THAN LAST YEAR'S TAX RATE.

THE TAX RATE WILL EFFECTIVELY BE RAISED BY 28.21 PERCENT AND WILL RAISE TAXES FOR MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS ON A \$100,000 HOME BY APPROXIMATELY \$_____.

The City Secretary is directed to post the applicable information regarding taxes on the City's Internet website.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its second and final reading.

Council Member Deal moved to approve the expenditures for August 19, 2023 through September 1, 2023. Council Member Goza seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.
